

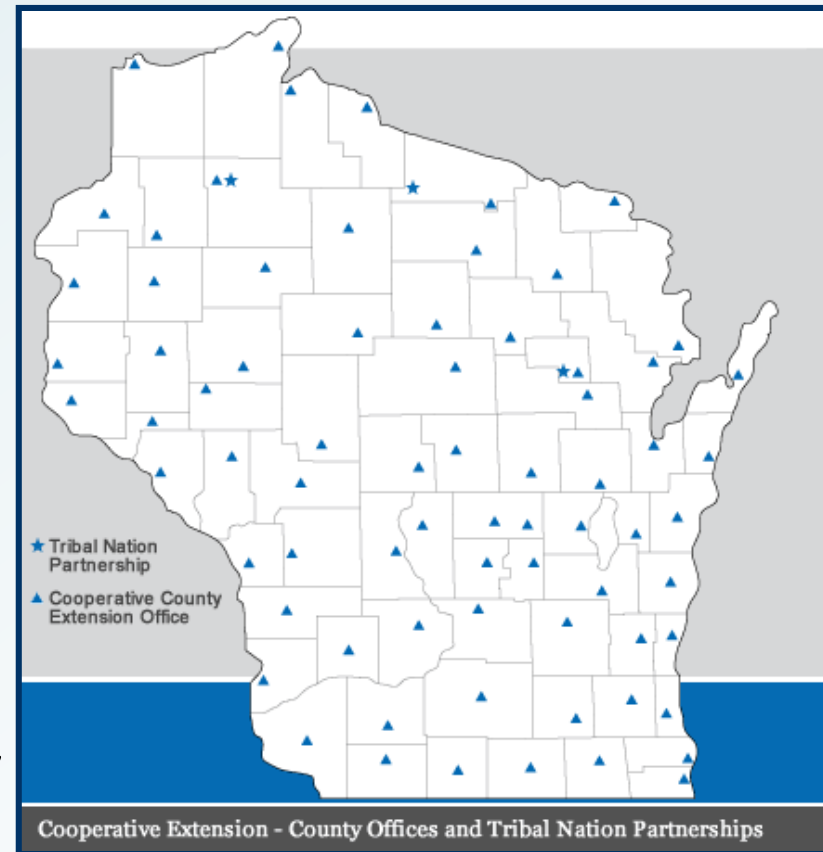

Suggested Meal Add-Ins

VEGETABLES

- Canned or cooked beans (pinto, black, navy, lentils, others)
- Canned tomatoes, salsa, or pasta sauce
- Single or mixed vegetables—canned, bag of frozen, or fresh
- Onions—any color, garlic

PROTEIN

- Cooked ground beef, turkey, or venison
- Cooked chicken, chopped
- Cooked fish or fish patties
- Hard-boiled egg, chopped
- Canned or cooked dry beans
- Nuts
- Cooked sausage or hot dogs

SEASONINGS

- Herbs, spices
- Seasoning blends (all-purpose, or ethnic seasonings or sauces)
- Low-sodium broth powder
- Canned broth (as part of the water when preparing meal) meal

Fiore Macaroni Dinner

1 package Outreach, Inc. Fortified Macaroni Dinner with Italian Tomato Basil Sauce	1 teaspoon ground ginger
4 cups water	2 teaspoons onion powder
1 teaspoon paprika	2 24-oz. cans black beans, drained and rinsed
1 24-oz. can chickpea powder	1 24-oz. can corn, drained and rinsed
1 24-oz. can tomato paste	
1 24-oz. can corn, drained and rinsed	

- Remove dinner's sauce packet from package. Drain 3-quart, microwave 10-15 min. stir.
- Pour 4 cups of water into container. Add macaroni to the container and stir.
- Cook, uncovered, on high setting of microwave for 1.5 minutes. Use parchment and grease from corn, etc.
- Repeat Step 3 four to six more times, or until macaroni is cooked to desired doneness.
- Add dinner's red sauce packet, onion, paprika, oregano, and the chick, onion, and garlic powders. Combine and well mixed.
- Fold in the prepared black beans and corn. Add more water, if desired. Heat. Yield: 6.

Note: Directions are for microwave with 1000 Watts (2000W) of power. If the wattage of your microwave differs, adjust the cooking process and amount of water.

Home-Style Vegetable Noodle Soup

1 package Outreach, Inc. Fortified Macaroni Dinner with Italian Tomato Basil Sauce
1 ground ground chuck, turkey, or venison
1 small onion, diced
1 24-oz. can vegetable blend, drained
1 24-oz. can dried tomatoes with basil and garlic
2.5 cups water
1 1/2 cups low-sodium chicken broth

- Remove dinner's sauce packet from package.
- Brown ground meat in a large fry pan over medium heat. Drain fat.
- Add onion, drained vegetable blend, canned tomatoes, sauce packet, onion, and chicken broth. Stir.
- Cook until bubbling hot.
- Add macaroni blend, and return the soup to a boil.
- Reduce heat to medium-low. Simmer, uncovered, 20-30 minutes, or until noodles are tender. Yield: about 6 bowls.

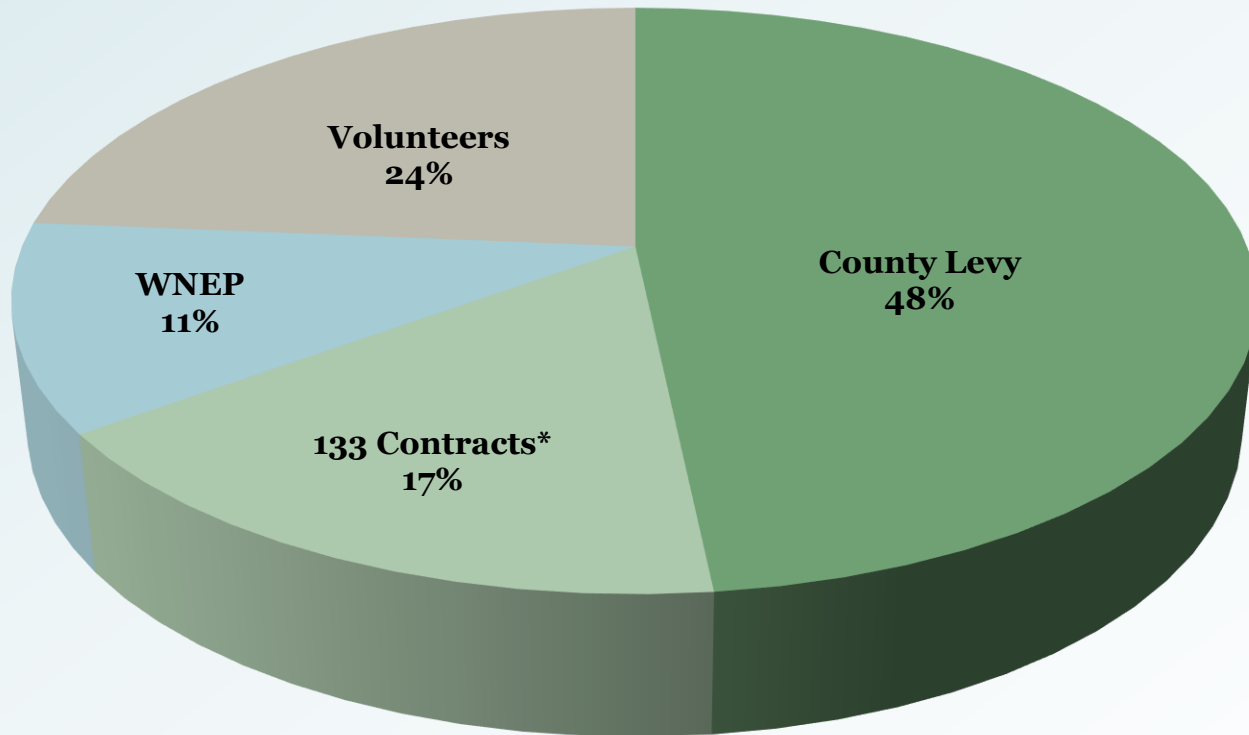
Leveraging Resources by Educating and Empowering Citizen Volunteers

*State portion of the 133 Contract

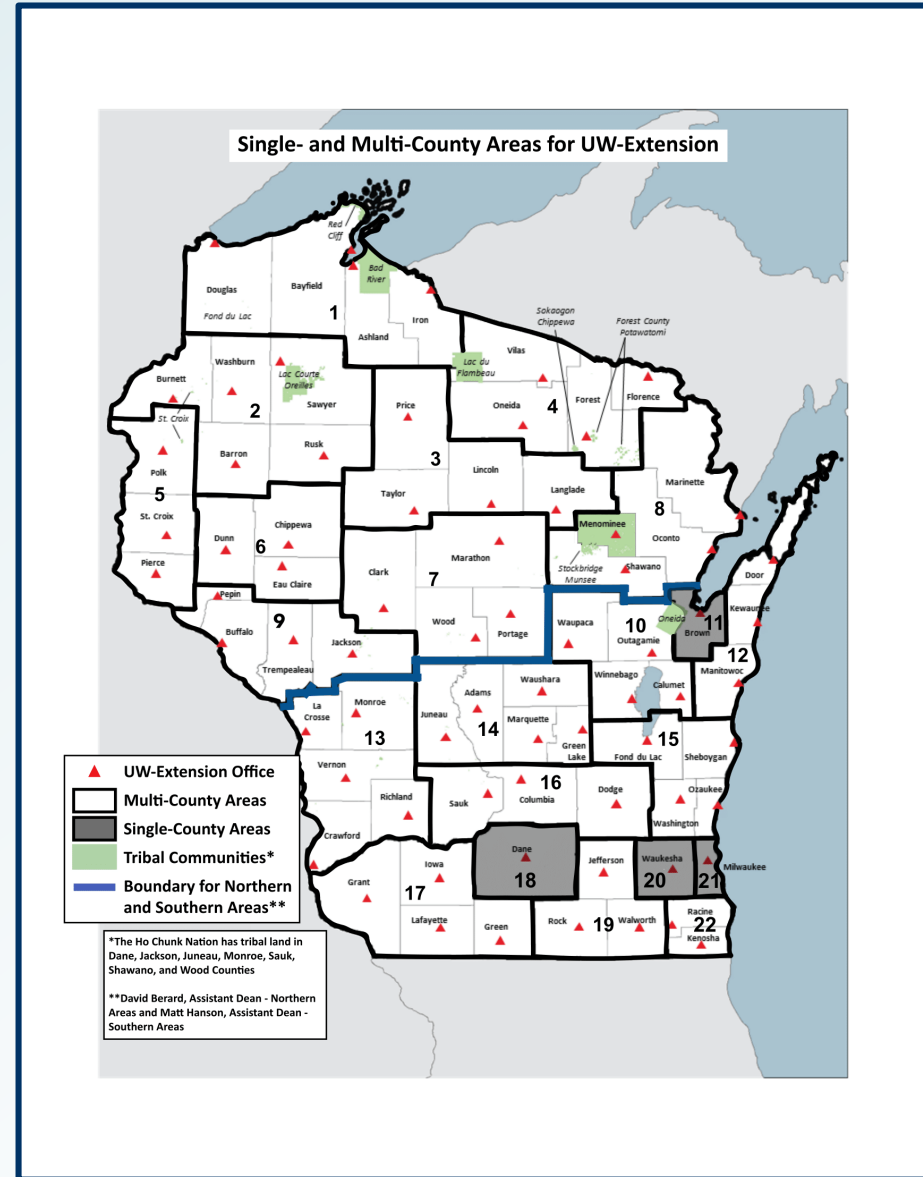
Performance Measurement
