COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT



Community Development provides educational programming to assist leaders, communities, and organizations realize their full potential. We work with communities to build the vitality that enhances their quality of life and enriches the lives of their residents. In short, the Community Development Institute plants and cultivates the seeds for thriving communities and organizations.

The executive director of Leadership Germantown, a local nonprofit, contacted Paul to provide a follow-up Real Colors training for class participants. Real Colors is an interactive workshop that teaches skills to understand human behavior and improve communication with others. Paul, along with Extension Human Development and Relationships Educator Carol Bralich, have provided ongoing Real Colors workshops for organizations since 2015.

In response, Paul and Carol taught and facilitated a two-hour Real Colors Refresher workshop for 14 participants. During the workshop, participants brainstormed and discussed key lessons they could recall from their first Real Colors workshop. Then participants paired off with opposite color partners to clarify misperceptions they may have about that color. Lastly, participants worked in primary color teams to brainstorm how their color responds to change, and then they shared with all participants during a large-group discussion.

Through evaluation (N=14), 92% of participants increased their understanding of others strengths, 92% clarified misperceptions they had about another color, 100% increased their understanding of how to communicate change to other colors, and 100% were able to recognize the strengths that others bring to the team when implementing change. Overall, participants evaluated Carol and Paul's facilitation of the session a 4.7 on a 5-point Likert Scale (1=poor and 5=excellent). Commenting on how they will use what they learned from the workshop, one participant stated "I will continue to consider others perspective as I implement projects and change." Another commented "I will consider different was to communicate changes with my team."

Re-establishing Washington County Child Care Director Network

Carol and Community Development Educator Paul Roback were approached by the CEO of the Kettle Moraine YMCA and the Washington County Economic Support Supervisor to assist in creating an opportunity to discuss observed challenges in the local childcare industry. As a result, a summit for childcare directors in Washington County was convened and participants identified a long-term goal to improve the retention of teachers and staff. Retention of staff impacts the availability of spaces for young children, which affects parents' ability to work outside of the home. Summit participants, including childcare directors and administrators, clearly indicated a need for collegial support and an organized space to network.

In response, Carol collaborated with the KMYMCA childcare director and created a needs assessment survey that was distributed to all Washington County childcare centers in June. From the 17 responses, childcare directors indicated a need to support each other in solving challenging problems and to create opportunities to learn from each other. Topics respondents felt would be most beneficial to discuss include licensing rules, continuing education, community resources for families, and staffing issues. The survey also asked logistical questions to determine the best time and method to meet. The first childcare director meeting will be held August 17th in West Bend. The agenda includes time to share ideas and programs, as well as establishing a framework for future meetings.

 An online self-study program, where participants learned about spending plans, credit, and paying bills on time. This effort is designed to improve the success of participants in maintaining timely payments so they have transportation to access employment and improve their credit score.





YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

Community Youth Development

- A series of meetings with UW-Madison Extension Colleagues as well as observing programming to better understand the role of the CYD educator and develop strategies for potential collaborations within Extension.

 collaboratively on community projects.

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AGRICULTURE



If it happens on a farm or in a field, the Extension Institute of Agriculture works with you to achieve better results. Our innovative dairy management programs range from genetics to farm and business management. Extension researchers work hand-in-hand with row crop, forage and fresh produce growers to provide best practices for every aspect of the growing phase. We also advise communities on using sustainable practices to create inviting spaces free from invasive species.

Extension Washington County has had a long, collaborative history first with the Washington-Ozaukee County Dairy Herd Improvement Association (DHIA) and today as Eastern Wisconsin Dairy Herd Improvement Cooperative (DHIC). In this partnership, Regional Dairy Extension Educator Tina Kohlman serves as an advisor to the cooperative's board which oversees an on-farm milk testing program for dairy farmers to know how well their cows are milking and to utilize the data to make management decisions to improve business viability and food safety while maintaining animal welfare. Not only is the data used by the farm to make management decisions, but also by agribusiness professionals and Extension to help support farms in areas of improvement.

Eastern Wisconsin DHIC provides a bi-monthly newsletter to its 400+ members, including Washington County dairy producer members and agribusiness community. As part of the collaboration, Extension provides the educational content of the newsletter while Eastern Wisconsin DHIC provides printing and postage costs. Content includes not only dairy related resources, but also timely crop updates with the recently published newsletter focusing on drought resources and feed inventories and management as we approach the fall harvest season. A win-win situation, Extension is able to outreach to the dairy community in additional ways with timely research-based information and resources while not increasing operating costs.

Crops
